Stanislav Golovin has performed as a solo, chamber and orchestral musician throughout the United States, Europe and Asia. He joined the faculty at The University of Akron School of Music in 2017, and the Cleveland Institute of Music Preparatory Division in 2019. Golovin is currently a member of Solaris Woodwind Quintet. He is a gold medal winner of the prestigious Ima Hogg Houston Symphony Young Artist Competition. Golovin has performed with The Cleveland Orchestra, Los Angeles Philharmonic, Houston Symphony Orchestra, Kansas City Symphony, Kansas City Chamber Orchestra, CityMusic Cleveland, Blossom Festival Orchestra, New Hampshire Music Festival Orchestra, Sunriver Festival Orchestra and Britt Festival Orchestra. He has played under the baton of Franz Welser-Möst, Gustavo Dudamel, Alan Gilbert, Hans Graf, John Williams, Manfred Honeck, David Robertson, Paavo Järvi, Lionel Bringuier and Giancarlo Guerrero, to name a few.

Golovin has won numerous awards and competitions, including the Darius Milhaud Performance Prize Competition, Tuesday Musical Club Competition, Wagner College Young Artist Competition, National Young Artist Competition of Uzbekistan, International Jewish Young Artist Competition, Fine Arts Award in Clarinet at Interlochen Arts Academy and CIM Concerto Competition.

An active educator, Golovin has served as a teaching assistant at the Cleveland Institute of Music and UMKC Conservatory of Music and Dance. He has also taught at Interlochen Arts Academy. Golovin has presented master classes at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst, University of Iowa, University of South Dakota, University of Missouri in Columbia, Truman State University, Kansas State University, Wichita State University and others. Golovin received his bachelor's and master's degrees in clarinet performance from the Cleveland Institute of Music and his Doctor of Musical Arts degree in clarinet performance from the UMKC Conservatory of Music and Dance. His primary teachers have included Franklin Cohen, Nathan Williams and Jane Carl.
