



Introduction

This publication is part of the Cleveland Institute of Music's overall effort to provide important information about personal safety to the CIM community. It has been prepared in compliance with the Federal Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act of 1990 (the Clery Act). The Clery Act was amended in 1992 and 1998 to include the Campus Sexual Assault Victims' Bill of Rights, which requires all schools to develop policies to address incidences of sexual assault on campus and provide certain assurances to victims of such assaults. The statistics contained herein refer to events that occurred between January 1, 2019 and December 31, 2019.

This report is created by the Interim Dean of Artistic and Facilities Operations at the Cleveland Institute of Music, who receives relevant information regarding Clery Act classifiable crimes and offenses from the CIM Security Department, CIM Dean's Office, CIM Senior Director of Human Resources, Case Western Reserve University (CWRU) Police and Security Offices, and the University Circle Police Department (UCPD), a local law enforcement agency. Each year a written notice is distributed to all CIM students, faculty and staff via email notifying them that the report is available for viewing at CIM's official website; the notification gives the exact URL address of the link to the report. Paper copies of the report may be obtained by anyone from the CIM Security staff at the Main Security Desk (MSD) in CIM, located at the East Boulevard entrance of CIM's main building at 11021 East Boulevard or by calling 216.791.5000.

I. General Safety & Security Information

CIM FACILITIES AND GROUNDS

The CIM main building is open to the public during normal business hours under normal circumstances for those persons who are attending concerts, taking music lessons or who have other legitimate reasons for being in the building during open hours. Note: during the COVID-19 pandemic, public access to the building is restricted and complete information about these guidelines can be found at cim.edu/return-to-campus. CIM's facilities are maintained by the Operations Department, which incorporates security and safety considerations into its maintenance planning, including lighting, grounds keeping and physical access. Routine inspections are made to identify safety hazards, and the department addresses any problems identified during those inspections. Oversight of the work of the department is provided by the Facilities Committee of the Board of Trustees.

RESIDENCE HALL SECURITY

During the period that the statistics in this report cover*, CIM's residence hall was located adjacent to CIM's main building at Cutter House, leased by CIM from CWRU. It was a co-educational facility. One classroom was located on the first floor, as well as the Resident Director's office and two staff collaborative pianist studios. Cutter House was secured 24 hours per day, and access was restricted by key card access to residents and to CIM students, CIM faculty and CIM staff. Guests of residents in Cutter House were required to be accompanied by the residents.

Fire alarms are installed in all residence halls and are inspected in compliance with state fire codes. As Cutter House was leased by CIM from CWRU, the Safety Services Office of CWRU, in conjunction with CIM's Residence Life staff, conducted fire drills each semester and provided information about fire safety on an ongoing basis.

Crime prevention seminars were provided by CWRU Security, CIM Security and police professionals in the residence halls as requested.

**Note: 1609 Hazel, CIM's new residence hall that opened in July 2020, is owned and managed by NewBrook Partners. It is a five-floor facility that is adjacent to CIM; on the first floor are residential staff offices, a classroom, restroom facilities and 22 Wenger Soundlok practice or rehearsal rooms. CIM leases the second and third floors from NewBrook Partners for student housing in suite-style configuration. It is a co-educational facility. The fourth and fifth floors are leased by CWRU for student housing. 1609 Hazel is secured 24 hours per day, and access is restricted by key card access to residents and to CIM students, CIM faculty and CIM staff. Guests of residents in 1609 Hazel must be accompanied by the residents. This information is provided for reference only; the statistics covered in this report end on December 31, 2019.*

RESIDENCE HALL SECURITY: MISSING RESIDENT

If a member of the CIM community has reason to believe that a student who resides in on-campus housing is missing, he or she should immediately notify CIM Security at 216.791.5000 (ext. 0) or the Residence Hall Director (ext. 227). CIM Security will generate a missing person report and initiate an investigation. If the concern needs to be communicated after hours, CWRU Police Department should be contacted at 216.368.3333.

In addition to registering a general emergency contact, students residing in on-campus housing have the option to identify confidentially an individual to be contacted by CIM in the event the student is determined to be missing for more than 24 hours. If a student has identified such an individual, CIM will notify that individual no later than 24 hours after the student is determined to be missing. A student who wishes to identify a confidential contact can do so through the CIM Dean's Office through the Associate Dean of Student Affairs. A student's confidential contact information will be accessible only by authorized campus officials and law enforcement in the course of the investigation.

After investigating a missing person report, should CIM Security determine that the student has been missing for 24 hours, CIM Security or a CIM Dean's Office representative will notify University Circle Police Department (UCPD) and/or the CWRU Police Department (CWRU PD) and the student's emergency contact no later than 24 hours after the student is determined to be missing. If the missing student is under the age of 18 and is not an emancipated individual, CIM will notify the student's parent or legal guardian immediately after UCPD and or CWRU PD has determined that the student has been missing for 24 hours.

UNIVERSITY CIRCLE

CIM is located in University Circle, a unique cultural, educational and scientific enclave within the city of Cleveland. University Circle is comprised of over thirty institutions that, together, constitute one of the largest diversified complexes in the world. CIM cooperates with CWRU, in a Joint Music Program at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. In addition, there are museums, libraries, concert halls, colleges and universities, hospitals, gardens,

churches, temples and residence facilities. University Circle's 500 acres, one of the most beautiful areas in the city, offers opportunity for serious study in many fields.

SECURITY AND POLICE PATROLS

The CIM campus is protected by overlapping layers of security. CIM maintains a security staff consisting of four full time guards and four part-time guards who report to the Manager, Facilities Operations. The security staff members are empowered to ask persons for identification and to determine whether individuals have lawful business at CIM. Security staff members are on site during all official open hours at CIM and make regular patrols of CIM's grounds; CIM security staff members do not have arrest powers. The CIM security staff maintains a close professional working relationship with UCPD, a private police agency consisting of 26 fully trained and commissioned police officers with full law enforcement authority. UCPD patrols the University Circle area on a 24-hour-a-day basis. The UCPD responds to all emergency calls typically within 5 minutes and can be reached at 216.791.1234.

In addition, the CWRU Protective Services security force patrols the area surrounding Cutter House (until the end of CIM's lease on 5/31/19) and the Hazel Annex (until the closure of the Annex on 5/3/19) on a 24-hour-a-day basis throughout the year. The CWRU Protective Services security force consists of more than 30 police officers, over 10 mobile security officers and more than 30 facility security officers. Those members of CWRU Protective Services who are CWRU Police personnel are commissioned as peace officers by the State of Ohio. In addition to basic patrol, security personnel respond to all criminal incidents and alarms and provide escorts and emergency assistance*. The CWRU Police and Security department's central dispatch office is staffed continuously and can be reached by calling 216.368.3333.

**Note: At CIM's current residence hall at 1609 Hazel, CWRU Police and Security personnel respond to incidents on the residential floors of the building while UCPD responds to incidents on the first floor of the building and the surrounding parking lot. This information is provided for reference only; the statistics in this report cover the period of January 1 through December 31, 2019.*

EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION

Emergency alerts are issued in the event of a serious or immediate threat to the safety or health of students, employees and visitors. The emergency alerts are issued in response to any events that constitute an immediate threat to the safety or health of the CIM community, including but not limited to criminal activity, natural disaster or extreme weather. CIM and CWRU both use the Rave emergency alert system. The Rave system notifies subscribers if there is an incident or event on campus that threatens public safety. All CIM students are automatically enrolled in both the CIM and Case CWRU RAVE systems with their school-issued emails but can additionally add other communication channels to their account in order to receive alerts via SMS text or phone call.

All members of the CIM community—students, staff and faculty—are encouraged to register in the Rave system by following these steps:

FOR CWRU ALERTS, Case login credentials are required (all CIM students, and many faculty and staff have Case IDs)

1. User goes to getrave.com
2. User enters Case Western Reserve University in the site choice box
3. User will be redirected to the CWRU single sign on
4. User logs in with her/his Case ID login credentials

5. User follows directions to register for or update personal information to receive CWRU Rave alerts

FOR CIM ALERTS

1. User goes to getrave.com OR getrave.com/login/cim (and skip step 2)
2. User enters Cleveland Institute of Music in the site choice box
3. New users click “forgot password” to register; returning users enter CIM email address and personal password for Rave site
4. User follows directions to register for or update personal information to receive CIM Rave alerts

EMERGENCY TELEPHONE COMMUNICATION

A “Code Blue” telephone is located on Hazel Drive adjacent to CIM. By touching a push button located on the “Code Blue” telephone post, persons are connected directly to the UCPD to report their emergency.

At the time that the Code Blue push button is activated, a highly visible, bright blue light also starts flashing to identify that someone is in need of emergency assistance. The system automatically advises the UCPD which Code Blue telephone has been activated, so it is not necessary that the person requiring the emergency assistance provide his/her location. With its rapid patrol deployment capability in emergency situations, it is anticipated that a UCPD patrol will respond to a call within one minute.

CRIME PREVENTION

Through CWRU’s Operation Awareness and the services of UCPD, a variety of crime information and personnel programs are provided for CIM. These include:

- Security alerts are emailed to CIM whenever a serious incident is reported.
- All students are auto-enrolled in RAVE notices, which include security alerts.
- Vehicle and property protection services are provided upon request for special events.
- Security and crime awareness orientation programs are conducted for all new students.

II. Policies

DRUGS & ALCOHOL

CIM conforms to all state and local laws controlling the sale and use of alcoholic beverages. It is illegal in Ohio to sell, provide, or serve beer, wine or liquor to anyone under the age of 21. The unlawful manufacture, distribution, possession or use of alcohol or controlled substances, including illicit drugs, is prohibited on property owned or operated by the Cleveland Institute of Music or as a part of any of its activities. No CIM employee or student employee may report to work at CIM or engage in any CIM related work while under the influence of illegal drugs or alcohol.

Students and guests living in CIM residence halls must adhere to federal and state regulations regarding drugs and alcohol. It is illegal in Ohio for alcoholic beverages to be made available by sale or otherwise to anyone under the age of 21. Underage students are not permitted to consume or possess alcoholic beverages on CIM property.

WEAPONS

Discharging, carrying or possessing firearms, including air guns or any weapons with which injury, death or destruction may be inflicted is prohibited. "Firearms prohibited" signs are posted at all entrances to CIM.

CRIME REPORTING

All crimes that occur on campus should be reported to CIM Security at .216.791.5000 or, if inside the main building at CIM, at ext. 0 using one of the numerous in-house phones located throughout the building. Security will notify the appropriate police agency to respond, depending on the type of crime. Crimes occurring on CWRU's campus should be reported to its security department at 216.368.3333. Crimes that occur off-campus in the University Circle area should be reported to the UCPD at 216.791.1234.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION AND PROSECUTION

It is the policy of CIM to inform all crime victims of their right to pursue criminal charges through the criminal justice system and provide assistance in this regard. In cases involving students, the Student Affairs Tribunal will conduct hearings under due process guidelines. This process is available to victims, whether or not they pursue criminal charges.

POLICY ON SEXUAL ASSAULT, INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE, DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, DATING VIOLENCE AND STALKING

CIM is a community dependent upon trust and respect for its constituent members: students, faculty and staff. Sexual assault is a violation of that trust and respect. It will not be tolerated.

Sexual Assault is a serious crime. Examples of sexual assault include any non-consensual and/or forced sexual contact, including but not limited to rape, attempted rape, sodomy, groping/fondling and any other nonconsensual sexual touching.

Lack of consent is the crucial factor in any sexual assault. Persons forced to engage in sexual contact by force, threat of force or coercion have not consented to contact. Persons acting under the influence of alcohol or other substances may be incapable of consent. Age or mental capacity may render consent impossible.

CIM strongly encourages persons who have been sexually assaulted to report the assault, seek assistance and pursue judicial action or sanctions for their own protection and that of the entire campus community.

Intimate Partner Violence occurs when a current or former intimate partner uses or threatens physical or sexual violence. Intimate partner violence also may take the form of a pattern of behavior that seeks to establish power and control by causing fear of physical or sexual violence. Stalking may also constitute intimate partner violence.

Domestic Violence may include a pattern of abusive behavior that is used by an intimate partner to gain or maintain power and control over the other intimate partner. Domestic violence can include

intimidation, manipulation, humiliation, isolation, frightening, terrorizing, coercing, threatening or hurting someone.

Dating Violence is violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim, where the existence of such a relationship is determined based on factors of the relationship's length, the relationship's type and the frequency of interactions between the persons involved.

Stalking is repeated or obsessive unwanted attention directed toward an individual or group that is likely to cause alarm, fear or substantial emotional distress. Stalking may take many forms, including following, lying in wait, monitoring and pursuing contact. Stalking may occur in person or through a medium of communication, such as letters, e-mail, text messages or telephone calls. In some circumstances, two instances of such behavior may be sufficient to constitute stalking.

Reporting an Incident

The Institute recognizes that a person who has been sexually assaulted or is a victim of intimate partner violence, domestic violence, dating violence or stalking, retains the right not to pursue either criminal prosecution or a CIM judicial proceeding. However, CIM strongly encourages those who have experienced or witness sexual misconduct to report the misconduct in order to seek assistance and/or pursue Institute action for their own protection and/or that of the entire campus community.

Individuals who have experienced any form of sexual misconduct or harassment may elect to report the issue through the Title IX office. Sexual Misconduct and Title IX guidance is available on the CIM website cim.edu/aboutcim/titleix, including CIM's Sexual Misconduct Policy, available as a PDF at cim.edu/file/title-ix-sexual-misconduct-policy.

Once a report of sexual assault, intimate partner violence, domestic violence, dating violence or stalking is made, CIM may be obligated to alert the campus community of the report. CIM is obligated to alert the campus of crimes that it determines represent a threat to members of the campus community. In making such determinations, CIM will consider the safety of students, faculty and staff, as well as the privacy interests of all persons involved in such incidents. Regardless of the action taken by CIM, the names of any person involved will not appear on Security Alerts. CIM urges anyone who has been sexually assaulted to report the incident at any time. However, prompt reporting may preserve options that delayed reporting does not, including the preservation of physical evidence, crisis counseling and immediate police response.

Medical and Psychological Assistance

Emergency Room Examination: Any person who has been sexually assaulted or is a victim of domestic violence, dating violence or stalking may go directly to the University Hospital Emergency Room or any local hospital for medical attention. Please note: The preservation of physical evidence is critical in the event of criminal prosecution and may be useful if CIM disciplinary action is pursued.

University Health Services: Students can seek further treatment at the University Health Services for any medical concerns, including sexually transmitted diseases and pregnancy testing.

Counseling: Counseling may be pursued following a sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking, no matter how much time has elapsed since the incident. Counseling services are confidential except when disclosure is necessary to prevent imminent harm to self or others. Available options, on and off-campus are listed below.

Institutional Sanctions and Criminal Prosecution

Anyone who has been sexually assaulted, or a victim of domestic violence, dating violence or stalking, may choose to pursue both criminal prosecution and CIM disciplinary processes. Regardless of whether criminal charges are filed, all members of the CIM community accused of sexual assault, or of domestic violence, dating violence or stalking, may be subject to CIM judicial action or sanctions, up to and including expulsion or termination from employment. In the case of student judicial proceedings, both the accused and the accuser are entitled to due process, to the presence of an advocate during hearings and to notification of the outcome of the proceedings.

Accommodations

In the aftermath of a sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence or stalking, upon request the Institute will make any reasonable available accommodation for requests for alternative living, working and academic arrangements as available and appropriate.

Due to the sensitive and traumatic nature of sexual assault, specially trained personnel are available to help anyone who has been sexually assaulted understand the many options open to him or her. Any student may contact a member of the CWRU Safe-Line Sexual Assault Response Team, available 24/7, at 216.368.7777. The staff member will help guide the student through medical, psychological and legal options while protecting confidentiality. Students may also contact University Counseling Services at 216.368.5872.

SEXUAL OFFENDER NOTIFICATION INFORMATION

In accordance to the “Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act” of 2000, which amends the Jacob Wetterling Crimes Against Children and Sexually Violent Offender Registration Act, the Jeanne Clery Act and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, the CIM Security Department is providing a link to the Cuyahoga County’s Sheriff’s Office Sex Offender Registry. This act requires institutions of higher education to issue a statement advising the campus community where law enforcement information provided by a State concerning registered sex offenders may be obtained. It also requires sex offenders already required to register in a State to provide notice of each institution of higher education in that State at which the person is employed, carries a vocation or is a student.

In 1997, the Governor of the State of Ohio signed into law House Bill 180, the Sexual Offender Registration Bill. The bill required Sheriff’s Offices throughout the state to develop and implement a registration system for convicted sexual offenders.

The Sexual Offender Unit for the Cuyahoga County Sheriff’s Office was developed and designed to inform, safeguard and prevent violent sexual crime in the community. The Sexual Offender Unit is responsible for registering and making the citizens of Cuyahoga County aware of serious offenders living in the community. The residence location of less serious offenders is also tracked on a database used to locate an individual in the event they repeat their former pattern of criminal behavior.

The Unit is also responsible for investigating complaints against a registered offender and, if necessary, executing a warrant for the arrest of the individual. A Common Pleas Judge must declare and classify an individual as a sexual offender. Further information relative to the classification of offenders can be found in Ohio Revised Code §2950.01 et seq.

The Cuyahoga County’s Sheriff’s Office maintains: 1) a list of registered sex offenders in Cuyahoga County, searchable by address, last name, zip code, and city AND 2) a link to the site search for registered sexual offenders within one mile of a specific address. The specific address for the Cleveland Institute of Music is 11021 East Blvd, Cleveland, OH, 44106. III. Programs

ALCOHOL & DRUG ABUSE EDUCATION

In an effort to provide a drug-free workplace, CIM has established the following drug-free awareness program:

1. Printed materials on substance abuse prevention are available in the Human Resources Office and the Drug- Free Workplace Info-Center located in the Mail Room.
2. If any employee suspects that they may have a substance abuse problem (alcohol or drugs) and wants to seek a drug counseling or rehabilitation program, they should contact the Senior Director, Human Resources, for referral to such programs. Requests for assistance will be kept confidential. Participation in such programs will be at the employee’s expense.

CRIME PREVENTION, CAMPUS SEXUAL ASSAULTS & RAPE AWARENESS PROGRAMS

CIM provides various prevention and awareness programs through Orientation and Residence Life Programming. Sessions are scheduled each semester that deal with issues such as substance abuse, sexual harassment and assault, and crime prevention methods. These sessions are held at Cutter House and though they are a required course for incoming freshmen, all CIM students are encouraged to attend. CIM also offers online training for all faculty, staff and students on Title IX, Sexual Misconduct and Harassment on an annual basis.

V. Annual Fire Report for 2019

The information contained in this report was compiled and completed in-compliance with the 2008 Higher Education Opportunity Act (HEOA). The Higher Education Opportunity Act was created by the Department of Education to address several issues on college campuses, including fire safety in on-campus housing. The HEOA requires universities to maintain a fire log listing all fires that have occurred in their on-campus housing. Cutter House Fire Statistics for 2019

There were four fire drills in Cutter House in 2019 administered by CWRU's Environmental Health and Safety Office (216.368.2907). All fires which may occur in the Cutter Residence Hall should be reported to CWRU police, CIM Student Affairs and CIM Security*.

**Note: this information pertains to the period of time (Jan 1-Dec 31, 2019) covered in this report. Currently, all fires which may occur in CIM's Residence Hall at 1609 Hazel should be reported to CWRU police, CIM Student Affairs, and CIM Security.*

All fires which may occur within the CIM faculty and staff offices should be reported to CIM Security and Building Operations.

CIM includes fire safety training for Cutter House residents during orientation programming each August.

Incidents: (These types of the incidents do not involve an open flame and therefore do not constitute a fire as defined by the Campus Security Safety Act)

The HEOA also requires the publishing of an annual fire safety report that provides information on the following items: statistics for fires that occurred in on-campus housing facilities; a description of the fire safety systems found in the residence hall facilities; number of regular supervised fire drills; policies or rules on portable electrical appliances, smoking, and open flames in student housing facilities; procedures for student housing evacuation in the case of a fire; policies on fire safety education and training programs provided to students and employees; a list of the titles of each person or organization to which students and employees should report that a fire has occurred; and plans for future improvements in fire safety.

Definitions:

Audible Fire Alarm Notification Appliance – A fire alarm system component that alerts by the sense of hearing (i.e. bell, horn, message, tones, etc.).

Cause of Fire – The factor or factors that give rise to a fire. The causal factor may be, but is not limited to, the result of an intentional or unintentional action, mechanical failure or act of nature (Higher Education Opportunity Act).

Fire – Any instance of open flame or other burning in a place not intended to contain the burning or in an uncontrolled manner (Higher Education Opportunity Act).

Fire Alarm System Monitored by CWRU PD – The building’s fire alarm system transmits a signal to the CWRU Police Department’s Dispatch Center, which is constantly attended 24 hours a day 7 days a week. Some fire alarm systems will provide the exact location to the dispatcher of the activated device in the building. This allows the Police and Fire Department to know the exact location of the area of concern in the building before they arrive.

Fire Drill – A supervised practice of a mandatory evacuation of a building for a fire.

Fire Extinguishers – A portable device containing a specialized agent that can be used to extinguish a fire. Fire extinguishers are installed throughout the buildings in accordance with the Ohio Fire Code.

Fire Rated Doors, Walls & Partitions (Passive Fire Protection Systems) – Passive fire protection systems are components of a building designed to have a certain degree of fire resistance. These components are designed to contain the spread of smoke and fire gases, and prevent the spread of them to a certain area for a reasonable period of time. Fire rated doors, walls and partitions are installed in areas to protect the evacuation of the occupants (i.e. stairwells), separate a specific area from another (i.e. mechanical room, student rooms, etc.), or separate adjoining buildings.

Fire-Related Injury – Any instance in which a person is injured as a result of a fire, including an injury sustained from a natural or accidental cause, while involved in fire control, attempting rescue or escaping from the dangers of the fire. The term “person” may include students, employees, visitors, firefighters or any other individuals (Higher Education Opportunity Act).

Fire-Related Death – Any instance in which a person (1) is killed as a result of a fire, including death resulting from a natural or accidental cause while involved in fire control, attempting rescue or escaping from the dangers of a fire; or (2) dies within one year of injuries sustained as a result of the fire (Higher Education Opportunity Act).

Heat Detectors – Devices that are only activated by heat. They are used in areas where smoke or steam is likely to be present (i.e. kitchens, bathrooms and mechanical rooms).

Intentional Fire (Arson) – A fire that is ignited under circumstances in which the person knows that the fire should not be ignited (NFPA 921). Example: Knowingly igniting papers on a bulletin board.

Kitchen Hood Suppression System – A specially designed fire protection system to extinguish fires that occur on a kitchen’s stove. Upon activation of the system it will release the suppression agent and activate the building’s fire alarm system. Kitchen hood suppression systems can be found in the common cooking areas (if available) in the Residence Halls.

Smoke Detectors – Devices that detect visible or invisible particles of combustion (NFPA 72)

Smoke Detectors (Fire Alarm-Initiating) – Smoke detectors automatically trigger the building’s fire alarm system.

Smoke Detectors (Single Station, Battery Operated) – Smoke detectors are not connected to the building’s fire alarm system and only sound locally.

Sprinkler System – A system of piping that is designed to deliver water on a fire to control or extinguish it. The sprinkler heads in the residential facilities are only activated by heat, not smoke or a pull station.

Undetermined – A cause classification for fires whenever the cause cannot be proven to an acceptable level of certainty (NFPA 921).

Unintentional Fire (Accidental) – A fire that does not involve an intentional human act to ignite or spread fire into an area where the fire should not be (NFPA 921). Examples: Cooking related fire, smoking materials, open flames, electrical, heating equipment, etc.

Value of Property Damage – The estimated value of the loss of the structure and contents, in terms of the cost of replacement in like kind and quantity. This estimate should include contents damaged by fire, and related damages caused by smoke, water and overhaul; however, it does not include indirect loss, such as business interruption (Higher Education Opportunity Act).

Visual Fire Alarm Notification Appliance – A fire alarm system component that alerts by the sense of sight (i.e. strobe lights).

Fire Policies

The following policies apply for all CIM buildings, including on-campus student housing facilities.

Smoking

- Smoking is prohibited within all University buildings and student housing facilities.

Open Flames

- Open flames, candles, candle warmers or incense are prohibited in residence halls, academic and administrative buildings.

Electrical Safety

- Ensure electrical circuits are not overloaded.
- Ensure all electrical appliances are UL rated and do not overload circuits.
- Ensure extension cords are UL rated and do not extend into other rooms through doors, windows or stairwells.
- Ensure festive lighting is UL rated.

Fire Safety Systems

- Do not tamper with fire protection systems. Ensure they are not obstructed from view or access. All alarm systems must be kept free of storage materials and remain readily accessible.
- Fire and smoke barrier doors must be closed at all times.
- Storage of items may not be within 24 inches of ceilings, block exits, stairwells, extinguishers, or fire alarm pull stations in any building on campus.

Holiday Decorations

- Holiday decorations must not impede fire safety devices such as exit signs, sprinkler systems, smoke alarms, strobe lights or any other device.
- Live Christmas trees and wreaths are prohibited.

On Campus Prohibited Items

The following policies apply for all CIM on-campus student housing facilities.*

- Hot plates or similar items with an open heating element.
- Upholstered furniture (unless certified flame retardant).
- Curtains, draperies, hangings and other materials suspended from walls or ceiling
 - Unless certified flame retardant.
 - Resident must be able to provide proof of fire retardancy.
- Space heaters.
- Refrigerators more than 4 c.u. ft.
- Any equipment that places an extraordinary load on the electrical system (i.e. electrical heaters)

air conditioners are only permitted with notification and approval as medical accommodation

- Halogen lighting sources.
- Un-fused surge protectors.
- Storage of motor vehicles within a residential facility.
- Flammable/combustible liquids & gases.
- Explosives/ Fireworks.
- Air rifles and guns.
- Gunpowder.
- Knives.
- Pets

**Note: The guidance above pertains to the period of time (Jan 1-Dec 31, 2019) covered in the report; however, some policies at CIM's current residence hall at 1609 Hazel may differ.*

Cutter House Building Evacuations*

- In addition to adhering to fire policies, students, faculty and staff must also understand and practice policies regarding activities during a fire alarm at Cutter House dormitory
- If a student, faculty or staff member discovers smoke or an actual fire, they should immediately pull the nearest fire alarm and evacuate the building.
- Upon exit of the building they should dial 216.368.333 to report the fire.
- All building occupants should become familiar with posted evacuation routes and procedures for the building. These are typically located in each resident room and near elevators, stairwells and exits.
- Any student residing in or present in Cutter House Dormitory must evacuate the building using stairwells and exits when a fire alarm sounds.
- All building occupants should know and memorize two exits from the building and understand that an evacuation may require them to evacuate a smoke-filled area. In the case of smoke, stay low and check all doors before proceeding to an exit.
- Windows may also be an exit option. Should one need to exit from a window, verbally summon the assistance of a first responder before attempting to exit a building from a window.
- Upon exiting the building occupants must move to a location away from the building and fire equipment until notified by first responders that the building is clear to be re-occupied.
- After evacuating, if you know of an occupant that may still be in the affected building, provide that information to first responders by giving the name and location of the individual so they may assist them.

**Note: The guidance above pertains to the period of time (Jan 1-Dec 31, 2019) covered in the report; however, evacuation procedures remain the same for CIM's current residence hall at 1609 Hazel.*
